

# 6th Grade RELIGIOUS LIFE

## OVERVIEW

**OBJECTIVE:** To trust in God's plan if he calls you to religious life.

### MAIN CONCEPTS:

- A religious order is a group of consecrated people who follow Jesus Christ through the pattern that their founder set.
- Each religious order has a distinct charism.
- God knows how to care for us and will lead us to the best vocation for us.

Choose the components you wish to use given the time you have and the needs of your students.

## INTRODUCTION

2 min

Summarize today's theme: Through these lessons we hope to become familiar with the vocations to which God calls people so that you will be able to follow his call always. Right now, you are in the single state of life, but someday God may call you to a particular vocation—married life, priesthood, or religious life. Today's focus is on the religious life.

## OPENING PRAYER

2 min

Let's draw near to God during today's lesson.

Read Mark 4:20

Pray a simple prayer from the heart or: Thank you, Lord, for calling us to yourself. As we study about religious orders, help us understand the depth of love you have for us here in this room. Amen.

## ESTABLISHING THE CONCEPTS

### GOD THE GARDENER

Have you ever seen a beautiful yard with flowers and plants that always seem vibrant? It takes a good gardener to make a yard like that. A good gardener knows a lot about the different needs of plants. He knows how much sun they need, what kind of temperatures they can withstand, when the seeds need to be planted, and how much water they need. A good gardener is attentive to the different kinds of soil that plants need—some need loose soil, others can't have it too acidic, some are sensitive to bugs, others need the wind. There are hundreds of variations, and a good gardener not only knows about those things but also takes special care to create the right conditions for the plant to blossom.

God is a good gardener. He knows our individual needs. Each of us will blossom well given different circumstances. Just as some plants do well in the shade and others do well in sun, some people thrive

Just as every flower does not look the same, each of us will not have the same gifts and talents. A person who is single may develop the gift of being a close and faithful friend, whereas a married person may become very nurturing. These gifts that God develops within us are charisms. Usually a married or single person does not formally identify their own charisms, but religious orders do. Each order (an order consists of consecrated religious men or women who follow their founder's example) has distinct charisms based on their founder's way of following Christ. For example, Dominicans have the charism

of preaching, Benedictines have the charism of stability, and Jesuits have the charism of contemplation in action. All these charisms are gifts of the Holy Spirit used for the good of others. God would probably not lead a person who has a very hard time focusing on reading to the Dominican order with the charism of study since he knows the way in which that person will bloom best.

## OPENING ACTIVITY

10 min

### Hangman

Lead students through playing a few rounds of hangman with the names of religious orders.

Examples are: Dominican, Franciscan, Jesuit, Carmelite, Benedictine, Norbertine, etc.

### Vocation Interview

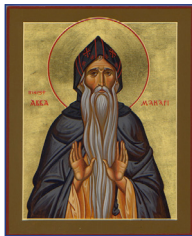
1. Watch "The Imagine Sisters Movement." Video link can be found at [www.vocationlessons.com](http://www.vocationlessons.com).
2. After watching the video, have the students imagine that they become religious brothers or sisters later in life. Ask them time to write their "vocation story" in a couple of paragraphs.
3. Then, in front of the class, have a student interview some of the "sisters" and "brothers" about how God led them to their vocations.

### ESTABLISHING THE CONCEPTS

#### ST. MACARIUS AND THE GRAPES



This is a story about a group of monks who lived in the fourth century. They lived spread out in the desert, each in his own little house. It seems that God led these people to the right vocation because, as you will see in this story, they have virtues that help them live the religious life.

Excerpted from the book *The Saints and Our Children*, by Mary Reed Newland:

One time St. Macarius was given a bunch of fresh grapes. He thanked the donor of the gift, and when the latter had gone carried the grapes to a neighboring monk who was ill. That monk thanked St. Macarius and when he was gone, carried the grapes to a neighbor who, as soon as that monk was gone, carried the grapes to his neighbor, and this continued. Late that same evening St. Macarius saw a monk coming to his hut bearing him his bunch of grapes, and "gave thanks that he had seen in the brethren such abstinence and such loving-kindness."

#### Be Curious

- Why didn't anyone take the grapes for himself?
- The charism of generosity and self-control was present in that religious community. What charisms do you see in the community of your school?
- Explain in your own words how God is like a gardener.

### EXPLORATION

#### VOCATION INTERVIEW

Now get your imaginations ready! What if you felt God calling you to become a religious brother or sister? Now imagine you actually join a religious order in your 20s. Write your imaginary "vocation story" in 2-3 paragraphs.



Your story should include:

- When you first felt attracted to religious life.
- What happened that made you actually apply to join an order.
- How your family and friends reacted when you told them.
- The work that you do. It can be teaching, serving the poor, working in a hospital, being a missionary, etc. (One real-life religious brother helped ex-convicts in Honduras to remove their gang tattoos so they could have a more normal life after prison!)
- How happy you feel doing this work within the order.

Get ready to tell your "vocation story" out loud, in front of the class. One student can pretend to be a reporter for the diocesan newspaper who is writing an article about you.

## REFLECTIVE PRAYER

5 min

### Litany of the Saints

1. Introduce the meditation.

Many of the founders of religious orders are saints. The saints are good examples to us of people who trusted in God to lead them in life. In asking them to pray for us, we become more like them in their freedom, bravery, wisdom and compassion.

We will pray the Litany of the Saints. A litany is a long list of short prayers where the leader prays a phrase and the group responds. In the Litany of the Saints, the leader says the name of a saint and the group responds “pray for us.” Toward the end of the litany, any student who was named after a saint can say his or her name, and we will all say “pray for us.”

2. Display the image of saints in the student section, if appropriate.

3. Pray the Litany of the saints. This can be found in the student section and hand out.

For each line, the teacher says the first part and the students say the second part. For example:

Teacher: “St. Michael, leader of the heavenly host,”

Students: “Pray for us.”

## VOCAL PRAYER

2 min

### The Angelus

1. If you have not previously in another lesson, introduce the prayer.

Mary’s “yes” to God can be our “yes” to following Him both today and later in our vocation.

2. Students pray the Angelus.

**St. Maria Goretti, patron of teenagers,** pray for us.

**All you holy men and women of God,** pray for us.
