Philosophy

What is a Circle of Grace?

The Catholic Church teaches that God has created each of us as unique and special. Genesis 1:27 tells us that we are created "male and female in God's image" and that God saw this as "very good." In that goodness, we are meant to respect ourselves and everyone else as persons created and loved by God.

Adults assist young people to recognize God's love by helping them to understand that each of us lives and moves in a *Circle of Grace*. You can imagine your own *Circle of Grace* by putting your arms above your head then circle down in front of your body including side to side. This circle, front to back, holds who you are in your body and through your senses. It holds your very essence in mind, heart, soul, and sexuality.

Why is it important to help our young people understand the Circle of Grace? God intends our relationships in life to be experiences of divine love. Respectful, nurturing, loving relationships increase our understanding of our own value and help us to love others. It is never too early to help young people understand how very special they are and how relationships in life are called to be sacred. Understanding this can help them to protect the special person they are and to be respectful of others.

Adults, as they strive to provide a safe and protective environment, hold the responsibility to help young people understand and respect their own dignity and that of others. A truly safe and protective environment is one where young people recognize when they are safe or unsafe and know how to bring their concerns, fears, and uncertainties to the trusted adults in their lives.

How is the Circle of Grace Curriculum different from other safety programs? According to research, one in four girls and one in seven boys will be sexually abused by age eighteen. Many protection programs focus on "stranger danger," however, up to ninety percent of the time the perpetrator is a relative, family friend or other person known to the child/young person. Circle of Grace goes beyond just protection by helping young people understand the sacredness of who they are and how to seek help through their relationships with trusted adults.

Goal of the Circle of Grace Curriculum - Grades K-12

The goal of the *Circle of Grace* curriculum is to educate and empower children and young people to actively participate in a safe environment for themselves and others.

Objectives of the Circle of Grace Curriculum - Grades K-12

- Children/Young People will understand they are created by God and live in the love of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.
- Children/Young People will be able to describe the Circle of Grace which God gives each of us.
- Children/Young People will be able to identify, discern and maintain appropriate physical, emotional, spiritual, and sexual boundaries.
- Children/Young People will be able to identify all types of boundary violations.
- Children/Young People will demonstrate how to take action if any boundary is threatened or violated.

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Leader Guidelines

- A Leader is defined as clergy (priest or deacon) administrator, director of religious education/formation, teacher, or catechist who has been trained to teach the *Circle of Grace* Curriculum.
- Every leader should read the Philosophy, Goals and Key Concepts to better understand and prepare to teach the *Circle of Grace*. The Key Concepts review the essence of the curriculum, that God is always present in our *Circle of Grace* because He desires an intimate relationship with His children.
- The time frame may vary depending on size of class, age of young people, amount of discussion, etc.
- Vocabularies with definitions are intended for the leader. The explanation of vocabulary should be integrated within the context of the lessons to assist the young people in their understanding of the *Circle of Grace* Curriculum. A master vocabulary list of the *Circle of Grace* Curriculum is in the administrator section. The pertinent vocabulary is listed in each lesson.
- If possible it is always "best practice" to have two adults in the room during the lesson due to the sensitive nature of the material.
- The 9-12 curriculum is formatted to be used in two ways:
 - ✓ The traditional way: lessons to the identified grade.

 The lesson for grade 12 is only to be taught to seniors.
 - ✓ The second way: select an alternate lesson or retreat to teach the class or group.
 - ✓ Leaders will need to keep a record of what lesson is taught each year.
- Ongoing reinforcement of the concepts is encouraged throughout the year. Hopefully, the language of *Circle of Grace* will become a part of a positive culture of respect, care, and faith that will help protect our young people and help them to know what to do when they feel unsafe.
- Your School Administrator, Religious Education Director, or Youth Minister Director will be sending out a letter to all parents regarding *Circle of Grace*. The parent information is included in the curriculum. Every parish/school is encouraged to provide parent education opportunities both to inform parents about the *Circle of Grace* curriculum and to foster greater communication in families.
- Evaluations for each grade are to be completed and returned to the School Administrator
 or the Director of Religious Education/Formation. The evaluations will be used to
 complete the Summary Evaluation that is sent to the
 for ongoing improvement of the curriculum and for the audit records.

Summary of the Key Concepts of "Circle of Grace"



God gives each of us a Circle of Grace (see below) where He is always Present:

Raise your hands above your head, then bring your outstretched arms slowly down.

Extend your arms in front of you and then behind you

embrace all of the space around you

slowly reach down to your feet.

Knowing that God is in this space with you. This is your Circle of Grace; you are in it.

God is Present because He desires a relationship with us.

- God is with us when we are happy and sad. God does not cause bad things to happen to us. He loves us very much.
- God desires to help us when we are hurt, scared or confused (unsafe).
- Having faith may not take away all of life's struggles. It is because of these struggles, God promised to always be present; providing guidance and comfort in our time of need.

God helps us know what belongs in our Circle of Grace

- Our feelings help us know about ourselves and the world around us.
- God helps us know what belongs in our *Circle of Grace* by allowing us to experience peace, love or contentment when something or someone good comes into our *Circle of Grace*.

God helps us know what does not belong in our Circle of Grace

- God desires to help us when we are hurt, scared, or confused (unsafe).
- The Holy Spirit prompts (alerts) us that something does not belong in our *Circle of Grace* by giving us "a funny or uncomfortable feeling" that something is not safe. This feeling is there because God wants us to be safe.

God helps us know when to ask for help from someone we trust.

- God gives us people in our lives to help us when we are troubled or struggling with a concern.
- God wants us to talk to trusted adults about our worries, concerns or "uncomfortable feelings" so they can help us be safe and take the right action.

Navigating an "Anything Goes" Culture

Sometimes young people reveal personal information or details about incidents that, in order to respect confidentiality, need to be handled outside of the group environment. If this happens, tell the young person, "Thank you for sharing that, ______. That sounds really important. I will talk to you about that later (at the end of class, at the break, as soon as humanly possible, etc.)." When this happens, be sure you talk to the young person at your first opportunity and alert the administration. Remember that you are the responsible reporter in cases of suspected abuse.

This lesson complements the following Catholic teachings:

Lesson Objective

Young People will be able to:

- 1. Recognize what is harmful to them spiritually, morally, and physically
- 2. Understand the connection between making safe decisions and our Circle of Grace
- 3. Discern safe choices from those that are not so safe
- 4. Recognize that making safe decisions protects the true self
- 5. Discern how they are pressured to be unsafe by an "Anything Goes" attitude

Materials Needed

- 2. Definitions of Circle of Grace and Discernment written on the board
- 3. Summary of the Key Concepts of Circle of Grace Handout for each student (front of lesson)

- 6. Scripture and Discernment Review for each student (end of lesson)

Opening Prayer:

Leader calls class to prayer by asking youth to quiet down and join in the Sign of the Cross. Then say together,

God,

We ask for Your guidance and a little more:
guidance in relationships,
guidance in decisions,
guidance in love,
and guidance in worshiping You.
Amen.

Getting Started

Distribute and review Summary of the Key Concepts Circle of Grace (front of lesson) with the students.

Vocabulary

<u>Circle of Grace</u>: The love and goodness of God that always surrounds me and others. <u>Discernment</u>: The ability to define and act upon the difference between safe and unsafe.

Briefly present the definitions of Circle of Grace and Discernment.

Today we are going to talk about an "Anything Goes" culture. What does that mean? How does this attitude affect our *Circle of Grace*? Think of yourself as a fish and of culture as the water we swim in – it is all around us. We can be heavily influenced by culture. But, within culture an attitude of "Anything Goes" has developed – nothing is right, and nothing is wrong. Movies, TV, the internet, music and even the news sometimes seem to tell us that "Anything Goes" But is it true that nothing is right, and nothing is wrong? God has created us with the ability to reason what is right and what is wrong. That process is called DISCERNMENT. Let's look at the acronym D.I.S.C.E.R.N. It will help us identify how we can use our God-given reason in determining what is a safe choice and what is unsafe.

Write the acronym D.I.S.C.E.R.N. on the board. Distribute the Decision-Making Guide and sheets of paper. Review how to use it. Student answers can be written on the Board. The Decision-Making Guide should be used for their discussion.

Now we will discuss each of the letters of the acronym.

Develop a habit of prayer before making choices.

Slowing down and turning to God before making a decision enables us to give some thought to the situation and ask for God's guidance. God never wants to see us hurt by making an unsafe choice.

Scenario: Your friend wants you to go to a bar with him. He tells you not to worry about getting in as he has perfected the art of making false IDs.

Refer students to their **Decision-Making Guide** to help them decide what they are going to do. Write the students' answers on the board.

What does God's word say? Read and Discuss: Mark 11:24

Influences affect our choices and safety- be aware

Many times, what others do cause us to just go along. We do not want to stand out as "not cool" and sometimes we worry that we will lose friends if we don't do what they want.

Scenario: You are invited to a party where you know there will be alcohol and no adult supervision. Your afraid if you don't go, you will lose friends.

Refer students to their **Decision-Making Guide** to help them decide what they are going to do. Write the students' answers on the board.

What does God's word say? Read and discuss: 1 Corinthians 15:33

Seek Advice

Before making a decision that you know may affect your life, it is good to seek advice of parents and trusted adults. Listen with an open mind then weigh the pros and cons.

Scenario: You have been offered a job at a bookstore that will provide you with a little extra spending money, but you know you are struggling with keeping your grades up.

Refer students to their **Decision-Making Guide** to help them decide what they are going to do. Write the students' answers on the board.

What does God's word say? Read and discuss Proverbs 19:20-21

Choose to listen to parents and other trusted adults.

God has placed us in the care of our parents/guardians and our Circle of Grace has taught us to choose trusted adults. They have a lifetime of experience and always have our best interest at heart.

Scenario: Your older neighbor who is a senior in college, has invited you to a concert about 3 hours away. He will be driving and wants you to go along as company. You

really want to see this concert. When you ask your parents if you can go, they express concern over distance and difference in your ages. They tell you not to go with him. What do you do?

Refer to your **Decision-Making Guide** to help them decide what they are going to do. Write the students' answers on the board.

What does God's word say? Read and discuss Ephesians 6: 1-3

Experience God's blessings

All decisions are not necessarily safe decisions. Prayer is essential to safe decision making. God is always present in this process and wants us to be safe and trust him. An awareness of God's presence really helps when making decisions. Even if our choice is unsafe, God is present and waiting for us to again be safe. Making safe decisions helps us experience God's blessings.

Scenario: Someone who you thought was a good friend begins to spread unkind and untruthful rumors about you on the internet. You ask him to stop, but he just laughs. You wonder what you should do about this.

Refer students to their **Decision-Making Guide** to help them decide what they are going to do. Write the students' answers on the board.

What does God's word say? Read and discuss Isaiah 41:10

Respectful language is a choice and defines who you are.

What food goes into your mouth is your choice. What comes out of your mouth, the words you say, is also your choice. As a child of God, your goal should be to choose that whatever comes out of your mouth is helpful, kind, truthful and respectful to others' Circle of Grace. Studies have shown that using foul language can make you seem dishonest and less intelligent than those who choose not to use it. This is not necessarily true; however, this is how it can be perceived. Controlling your language is a choice. What goes into your heart comes out of your mouth The same is true of what you view with your eyes, what you read, even what you hear other people say or sing. If bad things are going into your head heart and mind, what can come out of your mouth? Scenario: You are searching the internet for information to help with an assignment. When you type in a particular word, a pornographic site pops up. You become very intrigued. What do you do?

Refer students to their **Decision-Making Guide** to help them decide what they are going to do. Write the students' answers on the board.

What does God's word say? Read and discuss Luke 6:45

Notice the results of your safe and unsafe choices.

There is a chain of events associated with every decision we make. The impact can be safe or unsafe, but there is always a consequence. The effects of our decision-making can change the world around us...either for the better or for the worst. You may be one small cog in the wheel, but your decisions as young people can help to determine who you are as an adult. We all make mistakes and can change especially when we remember our Circle of Grace and we ask for God's help.

Scenario: The principal of your school has decided that the school will not host prom this year due to problems that occurred last year. You and your classmates are very upset about this decision and are thinking about posting your feelings on the internet. You wonder if that is a good idea.

Refer students to their **Decision-Making Guide** to help them decide what they are going to do. Write the students' answers on the board.

What does God's word say? Read and discuss Proverbs 3: 5-8

Remember that our openness to having an intimate relationship with God will allow us to hear the Holy Spirit's prompting to make good decisions.

Final Summary:

Distribute the Scripture and Discernment Review. Have students complete the review quietly. Bring the class together and discuss their answers.

ANSWERS: C, I, D, E, R, S, N

Closing Prayer:

Leader calls class to prayer by asking youth to quiet down and join in the Sign of the Cross. Then say together,

God help me slow down
and be present to Your everlasting love.
Help me have REAL conversations with You
that guide and heal my brokenness.
Cultivate in my heart Your truth
and help me respond to Your Grace.
Give me courage to reject the lie
that you are a "distant" God.
Bless me with the gift of discernment,
knowing Your compassion and love is not relative
but eternal.
Your greatest desire from me
is my sincere "yes".

- 3. Weigh the consequences. Name the pros and cons of each option.
- 4. Consider your Circle of Grace and your values. What is important to you?
- 5. Pray
- 6. Decide and act. Describe what you will do. Explain your decision.
- 7. Evaluate your choice. How do you feel about the action you took? Did you make a safe decision? Would you take a different action if faced with the same scenario again? What did you learn?
- 8. Does your decision respect your Circle of Grace and that of others?
